10. CONSIDERATION OF EXTENDING A MORATORIUM ON RESIDENTIAL SHORT-TERM RENTALS (STR), AND RECEIPT OF REPORT OF ACTIONS TAKEN TO ADDRESS CONDITIONS GIVING RISE TO MORATORIUM, PURSUANT TO GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65858
Presented by Christopher Cardinale, City Attorney

Purpose: Provide the City Council with an update on staff's development of permanent short-term rental regulations in the City, and to obtain City Council approval to extend the current moratorium on their operation. There is no budget impact associated with this item.

Recommended Action: 1) Conduct a public hearing, and thereafter adopt the proposed Ordinance extending the City's moratorium on residential short-term rental facilities to May 14, 2020; and 2) Review and approve of the attached report describing actions taken to address the conditions originally giving rise to the moratorium.

City Attorney Cardinale reported that on June 25, 2019 the City Council directed staff to extend the moratorium for up to 10 months and 15 days, or June 14, 2019. The public has been engaged on this issue and staff is moving forward with the City Council's direction to prepare a permit based scheme to allow STRs to operate. The current moratorium is scheduled to expire in two weeks, which would leave the City without any regulations on STRs. Staff is recommending the current moratorium be extended through May 14, 2020, as a stopgap measure which allows staff to enforce against problematic operators. A permanent ordinance will be presented to the City Council in the next several months; this ordinance is intended to be a temporary measure. Staff is requesting the maximum time for extension of this moratorium as a precautionary measure.

Mayor Brown stated this was the time and place for a public hearing to consider extending a moratorium on residential short-term rentals (STR), and receipt of report of actions taken to address conditions giving rise to moratorium, pursuant to Government Code Section 65858.

Mayor Brown opened the public hearing and inquired if anyone present desired to speak.

Debra Leazenby, Buena Park resident, spoke in opposition of the moratorium, expressed feelings of frustration with the process, and believes the prohibition is doing more harm than good.

City Attorney Cardinale stated the City cannot lift the current prohibition on short term rentals, because even without the moratorium STRs are still not allowed under the Municipal Code. The City's enforcement of STRs are complaint-driven so if a particular STR is operating and creating problems for neighbors, the City will probably hear about it.

There being no one further desiring to speak, Mayor Brown closed the public hearing.

Council Member Traut spoke about complaint driven enforcement, noting if there is an issue with an STR the City will proceed with enforcement and protect the neighbors. He stated he looks forward to options coming back to City Council sooner than the expiration of this moratorium. Council Member Traut thanked staff and the public for their helpful comments.

Council Member Swift confirmed staff will return with a permanent ordinance prior to the expiration of this extension of the moratorium. City Attorney Cardinale stated staff's intent is to return to City Council before the expiration of this moratorium.

Council Member Swift inquired about the timeline for bringing back a permanent ordinance. Director of Community Development Rosen stated staff does have competing priorities, however, staff is diligently working on this item to ensure an uncomplicated enforceable ordinance.

City Clerk Jimenez advised the City received letters in support of lifting the prohibition from three residents.

STUDY SESSION (11 - 17)

11. DISCUSS AND PROVIDE DIRECTION REGARDING POTENTIAL CLOSURE OF THE WALKWAY ACCESS BETWEEN THE BUENA PARK MALL AND MAPLE DRIVE
Presented by: Aaron France, Assistant City Manager

Assistant City Manager France summarized the staff report noting this item was calendared as a result of a petition submitted by residents of Maple Drive to permanently close the catwalk between Maple Drive and Buena Park Mall. There have been issues for nearby residents, including: vandalism, fights, drinking, graffiti, and other nuisance behavior. Several residents within the Tree Tract use the walkway as a cut through to the mall and state it is convenient. The City conducted a survey and the results revealed two-thirds of the residents preferred to leave the walkway open and one-third preferred the walkway be closed. Two hundred notices advising Tree Tract residents of tonight's meeting were sent out. Options for City Council consideration include:

- Leave as-is
- Close the gate permanently and install a chain link fence and lock
- Temporary closure, similar to San Antonio Park
- Leave open and invest funds to deter illegal activity

Roger Ungos, Buena Park resident, thanked the City Council for discussing this item and requested the walkway be closed due to problems experienced by family and neighbors. Mr. Ungos stated the walkway encourages graffiti, vehicle burglaries, littering, and people randomly walking into private properties.

Following discussion, City Council supported closing the walkway permanently.

12. DISCUSS AND PROVIDE DIRECTION REGARDING THE DRAFT COYOTE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE CITY
Presented by: Aaron France, Assistant City Manager

Assistant City Manager France reported due to recent coyote-related incidents in the City, staff has finalized a draft Coyote Management Plan for City Council review. The most recent discussion with the City Council occurred at the October 23, 2018, study session. At that meeting, the City Council directed staff to move forward with both a Coyote Management Plan as well as incorporate elements of Wildlife Watch. The City of Buena Park draft Plan mirrors several other Coyote Management Plans currently working and tested in other cities. The draft Plan also reflects what the City and staff are currently doing in practice. A new element to the Plan is the GIS-based coyote incident tracking system through the City's website where residents can now report coyote encounters. The online form allows residents to input their name, address of the encounter, and other pertinent information which is then directly transferred to a heat map. The map tracks and pins the location of the coyote encounter. In addition to the coyote incident tracking system, the draft Plan provides details of four critical areas: Education, Enforcement, Reporting, and Coyote Behavior/City Response. The draft Plan also details threat levels and the call to action for each incident based on its categorized danger or threat level. The Plan has been reviewed by the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (CDFW) and the Southeast Area Animal Control Authority (SEAACA). Representatives from both CDFW and SEAACA have offered feedback to the initial draft Plan and those comments were integrated into the current draft Plan presented to the City Council. The Plan has also been reviewed by the City Attorney's Office.

City Council discussed recent coyote related events in the Bellhurst area, properties that may encourage coyote lairs such as the Los Coyotes Golf Course or Ralph B Clark Regional Park, calling Buena Park Police if there is imminent danger by coyotes acting aggressively or attacking humans, coyote urbanization studies recently conducted by colleges, addressing coyotes on a regional basis, and coyote sterilization.

The City Council expressed support for adopting the Coyote Management Plan.

13. DISCUSS AND PROVIDE DIRECTION REGARDING THE HISTORICAL PRESERVATION AND RENOVATION FOR THE WHITAKER-JAYNES ESTATE AND BACON HOUSE DESIGN PLAN PROJECT
Presented by: Mina Mikhael, Assistant City Engineer

Mayor Brown recused himself from this discussion and left the dais, as he is a Curator of the Buena Park Historical Society.

Assistant City Engineer Mikhael summarized the staff report regarding the historical renovation and preservation for the Whitaker-Jaynes Estate and Bacon House design. The City contracted with Oldham Architects to assess the property for structural and historical improvements. Architects and historical preservationist from Oldham are here to present information on the improvements for the properties.

Ryan Oldham, Oldham Architects, presented information on approaches to historic preservation and reviewed options for protective preservation treatments for inside and outside the Whitaker-Jaynes Estate and the Bacon House. Mr. Oldham also provided additional recommended treatments for each property. Options for City Council's consideration:

Option 1: Time Appropriate Treatments

- Remove existing/historically inappropriate wall-to-wall carpet and refinish original wood floors
- Remove existing/historically inappropriate wall coverings, skim coat and paint walls
- Restore original wood shingle roofing
- Remove mismatched/historically inappropriate crown moldings
- Remove existing/historically inappropriate flooring in Kitchen.

Option 2: Restore to a General Victorian Style

- Replace existing/historically inappropriate wall coverings with period appropriate examples
- Remove existing/historically inappropriate wall-to-wall carpet and restore/refinish existing wood floors (or clean current carpets)
- Replace existing roof

City Council commented on the historical relevance of the properties to Buena Park; the historical appropriateness of the current designs; maintaining the overall structural design of the homes, including the bay window; and, determining the original colors of the homes.

Mr. Oldham advised the recommendation is for combination of Option 1 and Option 2: wall-to-wall carpeting and roofing, refinish the wood floors and shingles, wall paper and trim that enriches the interior of the home and maintains the general Victorian theme.

The City Council thanked Assemblymember Quirk-Silva for securing the \$500,000 grant for the renovation of the historic homes.

Council Member Swift requested staff return with options for rental uses for the properties for events and meetings.

The City Council supported design options presented by Ryan Oldham (combination of Options 1 and Option 2).

14. DISCUSS AND PROVIDE DIRECTION REGARDING A PROPOSED EXPANSION OF THE JAIN CENTER OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA INCLUDING DINING FACILITY, CLASSROOMS, LIBRARY, AND PRIEST QUARTERS; PARKING; AND, RELATED SITE IMPROVEMENTS LOCATED AT 8041 7TH STREET (PREVIOUSLY BIBLE CHURCH OF BUENA PARK)
Presented by: Swati Meshram, PhD, AICP, Senior Planner

Senior Planner Meshram introduced the item advising the Jain Center of Southern California has acquired property at 8041 7th Street, south of its existing facility. The proposal is to demolish the existing structures on the property and expand the Jain Center with a new 2-story, 41,834-sq. ft building with a basement parking garage. The proposed building will be setback 48 ft. from the front property line and will match the architecture of the existing center. Basement parking will accommodate 78 parking spaces and will be set back 5 ft. from the front property line. The proposed building will consist of multi-purpose halls for dining, lectures and community events; a library; classrooms; priest quarters; yoga room and supporting uses such as storage and restrooms. The applicant is also proposing a development agreement to allow for design flexibility from the underlying zoning including greater lot coverage.

Shirish Desai, SRD Architects, Inc., presented information on the expansion center project for the Jain Center, reviewed the proposed site plan for the basement and the first and second floors, and showed renderings and a video.

Ms. Meshram reviewed the next steps in the approval process: community meetings; public hearings for Planning Commission and City Council; modifications of entitlements for the development agreement; conditional use permit, and a lot merger.

Following discussion, the City Council supported the project's concept.

15. DISCUSS AND PROVIDE DIRECTION CONCERNING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CITY'S TEMPORARY SIGN ORDINANCE
Presented by: Christopher Cardinale, City Attorney

City Attorney Cardinale advised this item was presented at the previous meeting and direction was provided; however, the City Attorney's Office and City Clerk realized additional direction and clarification was necessary. The current temporary sign ordinance would still retain two carve outs for construction signs and real estate signs. The concern is that case law discusses content neutral versus content based restrictions on speech. In the public right-of-way content neutral based restrictions are stronger than a distinction based on content based restrictions. The recommendation is to include A-frame and T-frame signs which would be regulating the type of sign versus the purpose of the sign. Additional limitations would include time limitations, placement restrictions, and private property regulations.

Following discussion, the City Council directed staff to return with a revised ordinance for revisions to public right-of-way and public property restrictions.
